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than it is a skill. Your intentionally working on building a healthier family is both a sign of your commitment and a way to make it stronger.)

Check your progress at the end of each week by coming back together to talk about the changes you've made. Rather than evaluating each other, I suggest you share what you personally have tried to do and how you feel

you have done.

Then decide whether you more of a decision or attitude want to spend another week working on the same characteristic, or move on to the next item on your list. And remember to give yourself a pat on the back for the work you have done and the progress you have made.
